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The American Experience of War Featured in Smithsonian Traveling Exhibition at the Museum of Arts & Sciences, Daytona Beach, Florida

The American military in the 21st century is diverse and reflects the complexities of the country and the current times. "100 Faces of War," a traveling exhibition from the Smithsonian, with local funding provided through a grant from the Florida Humanities Council with funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities, presents the stories of those who served the U.S. in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. The exhibition will be on view at the Museum of Arts & Sciences in Daytona Beach, Florida from September 1 through November 25, 2018.

"100 Faces of War," organized in collaboration with artist Matt Mitchell, features 100 oil portraits of Americans representing a cross-section of home states, military branches, jobs and backgrounds. Each painting includes a candid, unedited, firsthand account of war. The statements take many different forms, including emails and letters to loved ones and poems and words written specifically for this exhibition. The portraits symbolize 100 different and highly personal ways of looking at valor, sacrifice and the human experience of war.

From 2005 to 2014, Mitchell, who did not have any connection to the military, felt compelled to connect with veterans in a meaningful way when he read an article in a local newspaper about an Iraq veteran coming home. He started painting the portraits of those who served and collecting their personal statements. Through this exhibition, visitors will come to know the veterans' courage, fears, warmth and humanity. More than 2 million Americans have served in the theaters of war in Iraq and Afghanistan from 2001 through 2014.

100 Faces of War is an exhibition organized for travel by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES). SITES has been sharing the wealth of Smithsonian collections and research programs with millions of people outside Washington, D.C., for more than 65 years. SITES connects Americans to their shared cultural heritage through a wide range of exhibitions about art, science and history, which are shown wherever people live, work and play. 100 Faces of War: Art Therapy Panel

Saturday, September 22, 2018 – 1:30-2:30pm

Addressing the growing field of Art Therapy, panelists will discuss the history of this practice and the goals involved in using the arts for emotional and psychological healing. Many different strategies and approaches have been identified over the years and is now recognized almost universally that artistic expression such as painting, sculpture, literature, music, theater, etc. can begin the healing process when other avenues have failed. The panelists included bring viewpoints from national to local and academic to community-based to show the many resources available to the public.

In conjunction with 100 Faces of War, a traveling exhibition from the Smithsonian Institution, with local funding for this program provided through a grant from the Florida Humanities Council with funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities, Florida Poet Laureate for Volusia County, M.B. McLatchey, will lead a workshop series in writing to connect. Ekphrastic poetry is poetry written in response to another work of art. This series is open to the public with a special invitation to veterans and family and friends of veterans. Like good talk over a good meal, writing helps us to connect with our loved ones, with our friends and communities, and with our own personal histories. By trying our hands at various forms of writing, workshop participants will explore how written expression can generate positive and creative directions in our lives. 100 Faces of War: "Art of the American Soldier" lecture by Renee Klish

Saturday, November 17, 2018 - 12:30-1:30pm

Bringing the military portraits in 100 Faces of War, a traveling exhibition from the Smithsonian Institution, with local funding for this program provided through a grant from the Florida Humanities Council with funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities, into context with the Museum's art collections, MOAS will bring the noted Army art curator, Renee Klish, the former Army art curator at the U.S. Army Center of Military History to lecture on her

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publication, "The Art of the American Soldier." This publication accompanied an exhibition mounted in 2011 in Washington D.C. based on the more than 15,000 paintings and sketches created by over 1,300 American soldiers in the line of duty. With no national museum to display this impressive collection, these works have remained in curatorial storage in Washington D.C. for decades, seldom made available for public viewing. With section headings such as, "A Soldier's Life," "A Soldier's Duty," "A Soldier's Sacrifice," and "The American Soldier," Ms. Klish will give a slide lecture on the history of the Army art program, from its origins in World War I through its current incarnations in Afghanistan and Iraq. Note that seating in the Root Family Auditorium is limited.

100 Faces of War: Painting Workshop with artist, Joseph Palmerio Saturday, November 17, 2018 – 2:00-5:00pm

Combo ticket admission includes on Planetarium show. Additional Planetarium shows are \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for children ages 17 and under. Parking is free.
